INTRODUCTION

I, the Chairman of the Committee on Estimates for the year 1988-89, having been authorised by the Committee in this behalf, present this Report on the Budget Estimates for the year 1988-89, in respect of the Tourism Department

2. A brief summary of recommendations/observations of the Committee is given in Appendix I. The summary is not exhaustive and for full recommendations or observations of the Committee, reference should be made to the main Report.

3. A brief record of proceedings of each meeting has been kept separately in the Vidhan Sabha Secretariat.

4. The Committee are grateful to the Commissioner and Secretary to Government, Haryana, Finance Department and the representatives of the various departments who appeared before them from time to time.

5. The Committee place on record their high appreciation of the whole hearted cooperation and unstinted assistance given to them by the Secretary, Haryana Vidhan Sabha and the officer/officials working with the Committee on Estimates The Committee would also like to pay special thanks to the representatives of Tourism Department Shri S.K. Sharma, Commissioner & Secretary, Shri Sanjay Kothari, Director and Shri Rajeev Sharma, Joint Director, who not only presented the functioning and problems of the Department very competently but also helped the Committee in getting a clear overview of the Tourism Department.

REPORT

The Committee on Estimates for the year 1988-89 consisting of nine members was nominated by the Speaker, on having been authorised by a motion moved and passed by the Haryana Vidhan Sabha in its sitting held on 16th March, 1988 and notified vide Haryana Vidhan Sabha Secretariat notification No. EC-1/1988-89/36, dated the 22nd April, 1988.

2. Shri Mani Ram, M.L.A., was appointed Chairman of the Committee.

3. The Committee held 30 sittings at Chandigarh and 18 sittings outside Chandigarh till the finalisation of this Report.

4. The Committee scrutinised the replies received from the Government in connection with the recommendations/observations made by the Committee on Estimates of the previous years in their different Reports from the year 1979-80, 1982-83, 1983-84, 1984-85, 1985-86 and 1986-87 pertaining to the Irrigation, Cooperation, Health, Excise & Taxation, Industries, Food & Supplies Departments and also orally examined the representatives of the Industries Department.

5. The Committee selected the following departments with a view to scrutinize the Budget Estimates for the year 1988-89.

- (I) Tourism ,
- (II) Animal Husbandry;
- (III) Social Welfare; and
- (iv) Revenue

- (II) Social Welfare The Committee could not frame the questionnaire on the Budget material for want of time.
- (iii) Revenue Non receipt of the Budget material from the department in time.

The Committee took a serious view of the inability of the Revenue Department to send the Budget Material at the belated stage. Thus the Committee could not scrutinize the same as the budget material was received in this Secretariat on 8-2-1989. The Committee, therefore, recommend to the Government that urgent instructions through circular letter be issued to all the departments that the material as well as replies to the questionnaire of the Committee be sent to the Haryana Vidhan Sabha Secretariat within a fortnight positively after receipt of the communication from the Vidhan Sabha Secretariat.

7. The Committee scrutinized the material relating to the Budget Estimates for the year 1988-89 in respect of the Tourism Department and orally examined the representatives of the Department.

IMPORTANCE, AIMS AND OBJECTS OF THE TOURISM DEPARTMENT

The tempo of tourism promotion in the State has been accela-8. rated appreciably during the year 1987-88. Three new Tourist Complexes at Narwana, Morni Hills and Krishna Dham, Kurukshetra (Centrally sponsored) have been commissioned, while the old complexes at Abubshehar and Asakhera in Sirsa district reopened raising the total number of tourist complexes in Harvana to 34. Apart from this 9 room motel with a conference hall, a renovated restaurant at Myna, and 20 new rooms Rohtak with a conference hall at Magpie Tourist Complex at Faridabad have been added. A new motel and restaurant at Samalkha and a Fast Food Service unit at Dharuhera, both centrally sponsored schemes have also been completed and commissioned recently

Like previous, the Crafts Mela at Surajkund was held from Ist February to 15th February, 1989 with the twin objective of projecting the beauty of handlooms and handicrafts producted in India and enhancing the tourist attraction of this place. The Crafts Mela which was organised in collaboration within Central Tourism Department and the Ministry of Textiles, was of great tourist interest that attracted the best craftsmen from various parts of the country. The Mela has become a regular annual feature of immense tourist significance, attracting participation of the best craftsmen from various parts of the country.

The feature projections will take Haryana Tourism to further heights. While the facilities at the existing complexes will be expanded to cater to a large tourist traffic of 32.00 lacs domestic 2.00 lacs international tourists expected to visit Haryana during 1988. The complexes of Hodal, Uchana, Pinjore Garden and Hisar will have priority in this process. A new tourist complex at Damdama is being developed with Central assistance. Similarly a new complex at Bahadurgarh is being developed with central assistance. More new complexes at Panchkula, Gurgaon, Hisar, Bhiwani are proposed to be developed soon.

During the year 1987-88, the overall occupancy of the Harvana Tourist Complexes was about 82% as compared to 77% during 1986-87. Harvana Tourism Corporation earned a net profit of Rs. 27.00 lacs during 1987-88, after depositing an amount of Rs. 45.00 lacs with the Government towards rent of Motels/Huts and also meeting the liability of Rs. 37.50 lacs on account of interest on the loan of Rs. 2.25 crores taken by the Corporation. Some more money is being deposited during this financial year on account of rent of non-commercial buildings.

Haryana Tourism is also extending consultancy services to other state Government/Private Organisations in the execution; designing, interior decoration of buildings and publicity matters.

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ORGANISATIONAL SET UP OF THE DEPARTMENT

9. The departmental working at the Government level is supervised by an officer of the status of Commissioner and Secretary to Government, Haryana, who is assisted by the Director of the Department. The department intimated that the Haryana Tourism Corporation was created with effect from 1-9-1974 and most of the staff at the headquarters as well as in the field was diverted to the Corporation referred to above. The Corporation is functioning as an agent of the department. The Director at the headquarters is assisted by two Joint Directors—One belonging to HCS and other is a departmental promotee, two project Officers, one Superintendent and other subordinate staff. Two administrative set up charts showing the position of the officers/officials at the Headquarters and the Subordinate offices are enclosed

BUDGET ESTIMATES

10. The total Budget allocation of the Department is under Plan and Non-Plan is to the tune of Rs. 3,10,92,900. The headwise detail is as under :----

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As the Department has a vital role to play in the economy of the State, keeping this aspect in view, the Committee, after scrutinizing the replies to the questionnaire prepared by the Committee and furnished by the Department, decided to examine the Commissioner & Secretary to Government, Haryana Tourism Department, by way of seeking clarification/ explaination on some points and, therefore, the Committee examined the Departmental Representatives.

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TO INTRODUCE NEW JOB ORIENTED COURSES

11. The department in its written reply stated that at present only

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four courses are being taught in the Catering Institute at Panipat namely :----

1. Diploma in Hotel Management, Catering & Nutrition;

2. Diploma in Hotel Reception and Book-keeping ;

3. Diploma in Hotel Restaurant and Counter Service ; and

4. Diploma in Cookery.

The Committee recommend that in addition to the above said courses some more different type of courses are absolutely essential for imparting training to the young men & women in different disciplines like Bakery, Confectionery, Food Preservation, Canning and House Keeping etc. in the above said Catering Institute so that more avenue of jobs may be got available to the unemployed youths of the State.

STIPEND TO THE STUDENTS OF SCHEDULED CASTES AND BACKWARD CLASSES

12. To the questionnaire of the Committee, department in their written reply stated that the stipend is being awarded to 25% students in each group @ 125 P.M. on merit-cum-means basis Out of total admissible number of students 20% stipend/scholarship are reserved for the students belonging to Scheduled Castes & Backward Classes. The Committee is not fully satisfied with the stipend policy adopted by the department. The Committee, therefore, strongly recommend that the Department should take up this matter with the Government so that the stipend may be awarded to every student belonging to the Scheduled Castes & Backward Classes in each group. The action taken in this respect be intimated to the Committee.

RECOGNITION OF THE PANIPAT CATERING INSTITUTE

13. It came to the notice of the Committee at the time of the oral examination that the Institute of Catering and Hotel Management Panipat was not affiliated with any Institute/University or Board so far. The Committee was very much surprised to know this and of the opinion that the department did not take special efforts to get this Institute recognised which was set up in July, 1973. The Committee, therefore, recommend that sincere efforts be made to get this Institute recognised with the Technical Education Board, Haryana and the Food Craft Institute of India without further loss of time. The action taken in this respect be intimated to the Committee.

ADMINISTRATIVE REPORT

14. In reply to the questionnaire of the Committee the department stated in their written reply that the Administrative Report for the year 1986-87 is under print and the Administrative Report for the year 1987-88 would be sent to the State Government for approval by the end of September, 1988. The department further stated during the course of oral examination that the Administrative Report for the year 1986-87 has been printed and the Administrative Report for the year 1987-88 has been sent to the Government for approval.

The Committee observed that the purpose and significance of the Administrative Report is almost lost if it is not made available in the following year.

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The Committee, therefore, recommend that suitable steps be taken to ensure that in future the Annual Administrative Report of the department must be published after the close of the financial year to which it relates.

CATEGORY-WISE WORK ALLOCATED TO THE INCUMBENT OF EACH POSTS

15. During the course of oral examination, the Committee desired to have some information regarding the category-wise work entrusted to the incumbent of each post which was not readily available with the representative of the department. The departmental representatives assure the Committee that the desired information would be sent later on. But the said information, as asked for by the Committee, was not furnished by the department till the finalisation of this Report. The Committee, therefore, recommend that this information be supplied to them at the earliest.

FILLING UP OF VACANT POSTS

16. In reply to the questionnaire of the Committee, the Department supplied information that one post each of Joint Director, Deputy Director, Deputy Superintendent & Statistical Assistant are lying vacant. After scrutinizing the information so supplied, The Committee recommend that all the above said vacant posts be filled up immediately as the department is one of the expanding departments and has vital role to play in the economy of the State.

FOREIGN TOURS

17. During the course of oral examination on a question asked by the Committee, whether any officer of the department went abroad for the purpose of training/refreshing course. The departmental representatives informed that no officer of this department went abroad for the purpose of training/refreshing course, except for commercial purposes. The Committee further asked the departmental representatives to supply a list of those officers who went abroad for the said purpose which was awaited till the time of finalization of this report. The Committee, therefore, desire that the required information alongwith the names of the visiting officers together with the purpose of their visits and the expenditure incurred on their visits be intimated to the Committee at the earliest.

TOURIST COMPLEXES AT AGRA AND HARIDWAR

18. During the course of oral examination, the department informed the Committee that a proposal is under consideration of the department to open a Tourist Complex at Agra and efforts are being made to select a suitable place for the said complex by the department shortly. The Committee desire that besides the Tourist Complex at Agra, a Tourist Complex should also be opened at Haridwar keeping in view the religious sanctity and natural beauty of the place. The Committee further desire that the accommodation at Haridwar may be made available at nominal rates, so that the common people can avail the facility at this religious place.

PUBLICITY

19. During the course of oral examination, the departmental representatives informed the Committee that the publicity work is also being done by the department and for this purpose, an amount of Rs. 11 lakh has been earmarked. The Committee is of the view that proper publicity is not being made by the department specially for the Ruralites.

For the promotion of Tourism, it is imperative to give wide publicity to all the programmes and activities of the department and to project in detail the facilities which have been provided by the Government for the visiting tourists in the State of Haryana. To achieve this objective, the department has to depend heavily on the press advertisements which are the only and major source of disseminating whole some information to every part of the country.

For this purpose the department feel that more funds should be allocated under this head. It was also informed to the Committee that in neighbouring States of U.P. and J. & K. they have incurred heavy expenditure on the publicity work.

The Committee recommend that some handsome amount be earmarked for this purpose so that our State can atrract maximum number of Tourists.

The Committee further recommend that a documentary film of various Tourist Complexes of the State be prepared and shown in the villages as well as in important fairs held in the State from time to time so that the general public should know about the important historical places and tourist activities of the State.

TOURIST TRAVEL AGENCY

20. At the time of oral examination, the Committee felt that in the absence of Tourist Travel Agency, the Tourism in Haryana is lagging

behind from other States Since the Department has no sufficient vehicles of its own, and no conducted tours are being arranged In order to give vide publicity about tourists facilities and places of tourists interest in the State, the department of Tourism should have their own independent Tourist Travel Agency.

The Committee, therefore, recommend to the Government that with a view to promote tourism in the State/outside the State, a Travel Agency by providing luxury coaches and Air Conditioned Cars, be opened at Delhi and Chandigarh.

The Committee further recommend that to promote Tourism sense among the people of Haryana as well as to the employees of the State Government, the department should take suitable steps to organise tours of various Tourists Spots in the State/ outside the State by providing Video Coaches at a moderate rates. The steps taken by the Department in this direction be intimated to the Committee.

TRANSFER POLICY OF THE DEPARTMENT

21. The Committee also discussed the transfer policy of the officers of the Department with the representatives of the Department. After some discussion, the Committee desire that the persons in the I. A. S. / H. C. S. cadres who have interest in promoting the tourism and other related matters be allowed to remain in the Tourism Department for a period of atleast three years so that the Department may utilise the services of such persons who had been given training at the Department expenses.

TOURIST INFORMATION CENTRES

22. The Departmental representatives during the course of oral examination informed the Committee that the Tourist Information Centres at Agra and Madras were closed down on account of some Administrative reasons.Now the department feels that due to the closure of Tourist Infor-mation Centre of Madras, the number of Tourist visiting Haryana from other countries as well as from other States has been declined. The main object of running the Information Centres is to impart information to the visiting tourists, both foreign and domestic who are interested in visiting the places of tourist interests in the State. The Committee was informed that during the year 1987-88, the total No. of tourist visited various complexes of the State was 34,71,364 & out of that the number of foreigners was 1,07;843. These Centre help the domestic & foreign tourists visiting the State in planning their tours in such a manner as may enable them to visit maximum places of historical and archaeological interest within the shortest possible period. Illustrated literature in respect of Tourist Complexes is also distributed through these Centres. It is also the function of these Centres to induce the tourists to visit Haryana. The Committee

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fully satisfied with the above noted facts given by the Department and recommend that for the convenience of foreign/domestic tourists and with a view to provide maximum facilities & supply information to them about places of interest in our State, the Tourist Information Cent. e at Madras be opened again at a suitable place with sufficient staff.

CATERING ARRANGEMENTS AT BUS STANDS

23. During the course of oral examination, the departmental representatives informed the Committee that the catering facilities at the rate of Rs. 4/- per meal is being provided at Ballabgarh and Sirsa bus stands. The Committee is very much impressed with this facility provided by the department and recommend that such facilities may also be made available to all other important bus stands in the State.

The Committee further recommend that a fast food service counter at Dabchik (Hodel) Tourist Complex on the pattern of Dharuhera Tourist Complex be started so that it can cater to a large traffic on the National Highway as this complex is located on one of the busiest tourist routes on National Highway and also frequently visited by the foreign tourists and the action taken in this respect be intimated to them.

RENOVATION/EXPANSION OF TOURIST COMPLEXES

24. During the spot tour of various Tourist Complexes, the Committee observed that with the aid of the Government of India, the work of renovation and expansion of some Tourist Complexes is in progress (list of which is attached at Annexure 'A'). The Committee finds that the work of renovation/expansion of almost half of the complexes is not completed so far. The Committee take a serious view of the slow pace of work. The Committee, therefore, recommend that the construction work of various complexes taken in hand be completed at the earliest, so that additional facilities at various complexes may be made available to cope with the increasing demand of the tourist traffic in the State.

The departmental representatives also informed the Committee, that negotiations are going on with the Government of India in regard to opening/set up of New Complexes in the State (list of which is attached at Annexure 'B').

The Committee recommend that the department should persue the matter with the Government of India vigorously to get these schemes/projects cleared at the earliest. The action taken in this matter may be intimated to the Committee in due course.

OFFICE OF DIRECTOR/MANAGING DIRECTOR

25. On being asked by the Committee in regard to dual charge of the Director, Tourism Department and the Managing Director, Haryana Tourism Corporation, the Committee were informed that the Director; T ourism Department, has been functioning as the Managing Director of Haryana Tourism Corporation since the formation of the Corporation except for short period when these two posts have been manned by Separate Head of Departments. However, in the present set up both the organisations are functioning under one head and no problem is being faced by the Department and all departmental matters are pursued/ disposed off expeditiously with complete cohesion with the Corporation.

The Committee agreed that though there is no objection that the Director and the Managing Director may be the same person for better coordination etc. etc. but keeping in view of the economic aspects of the State the Director of Tourism Department and Managing Director of Tourism Corporation should sit in one Room as both the organisations are being headed by one person and all the affairs of the Department/Corporation are also being managed from the same building and action taken in this regard be intimated to the Committee.

BUS SERVICE FOR BADKHAL LAKE/SURAJKUND COMPLEXES

26. During the spot inspection of some Tourist Complexes, it came to the notice of the Committee that no bus service is available for Surajkund and Badkhal Lake from Delhi for the General Public who used to visit these Complexes at week ends and on holidays. Due to the Non plying of bus service between Delhi-Surajkund and Badkhal, the visitors/tourists have to face a great inconvenience. To avoid this difficulty of the people, the Committee is of the opinion that the Tourism Department should take up the matter with the Transport Department to start a regular bus service between Delhi to Surajkund/Badkhal Lake Complexes, so that the people can visit these complexes without any inconvenience.
