1, the Chairman of the Committee on Public Undertakings having been authorised by the Committee in this behalf present this Twentieth Report on the general working of the Haryana Housing Board

2 During oral evidence, the Committee examined the represent tatives of the Department/Board concerned A brief record of the proceedings of each meeting of the Committee held during the year 1985 86 has been kept in the Haryana Vidhan Sabha Secretariat

3 The Committee place on record their appreciation of the valuable assistance given to thom by the Accountant General, Haryana, and his staff and are thankful to the Secretary to Government, Haryana Finance Departmont, including his representatives and the representatives of the D_partment/Board who appeared before them from time to time The Committee are also thankful to the Secretary, Deputy Secretary and the Staff of the Haryana Vidhan Sabha Secretariat for the whole hearted co op_ration and unstinted assistance given in preparing this report

1 Iutroductory

The Haryana Housing Board, a Corporate Body was created in August 1971 The main object of the Housing Board is to provide for measures to be taken to deal with and satisfy the needs of the housing accommodation in the State The Board undertakes in any area the framing and execution of Housing schemes independently or on being entrusted by the State Government The Board consists of the Chairman and twelve other members appointed by the State Government The Haryana Heusing Board Act 1971 inter alia envisages drawal by the Board of annual housing programmes to be got sanctioned from the Government publication of the schemes drawn by the notification before execution and taking measures for expediting construction of buildings and contiolling the cost thereof

2 Activities of the Board

According to the written material supplied to the Committee the Board had allotted upto 31st March 1985 23 050 houses out of which 75 percent had been allotted to the people belonging to economically weaker sections and low income categories Details of such houses allotted, station wise/category-wise is given in Annexure A

During the course of oral evidence on 10th June 1985 the repre sentative of the Board informed the Committee that $17\frac{1}{2}$ percent houses were being reserved for allotment to the persons belonging to Scheduled Castes etc and 9 percent for Ex servicemen and war widows The State Government vide memo dated 15th April 1980 had also authorised the Chairman of the Board to allot 5 percent of the total houses in a scheme at his discretion Subsequently on receipt of certain complaints the allotment of houses against 5 percent discretionery quota was dispensed with by the State Government vide memo dated 26th February 1982 List of the persons as were allotted houses out of the discretionery quota of the Chairman is given at Annexure B

The Committee are happy that the Board is selling E W S and L I G houses at no profit no loss basis The Committee, however, feel that the cost of houses is still very much on the higher side and beyond the reach of poor people The Committee would therefore, like to emphasize the need of finding ways and means to reduce the cost of the E W S and L I G houses For E W S houses, the Committee would like that the desirability of following the pattern of Kerala, where the cost of such houses is much less, be considered and appropriate steps in that direction be taken. The Committee also feel that if the allotments are made before the construction of houses and the concerned persons are associated for rendering self labour, it will not only increase the acceptability of the houses but will also substantially reduce their cost.

One of the reasons for high cost the Committee feel, is that though the Board has been in existence since 1971, yet no long term programme has been drawn up and as a consequence, with the passage of time not only the cost of construction increases but the prices of land also shoot up resulting in increase in the prices of the houses The Committee are of the opinion that if any organisation is to work methodically and systematically it must plan its activities well in advance keeping in view the physical and financial resources as its disposal

The Committee would, therefore, like the Board to prepare blue prints for a long term programme and consider the desirability of acquiring large chunks of land for utilization during the next 5-10 years The Committee would also like the Board to consider the desirability of evolving self financing scheme on the pattern of DDA, particularly in the case of MIG and HIG houses

3 Schemes/Works being carried out or proposed to be carried out by the Board

The Haryana Housing Board has acquired land at Palwal Jind Narwana Gurgaon (Chakarpur Sikandarpur) Sonepat where housing colonies are proposed to be built The Housing Board also proposes to construct houses of Mewat Development Board at Ferozepur Jhirka Punhana and Roze Kamoi Under the Urban Housing Schemes houses are proposed to be constructed at Panchkula, Nangal Sodhian (Pinjore) Kalka Ambala City Kurukshetra Hissar Sonepat Siisa Faridabad Sector 3 Faridabad Sector 29 Gurgaon Sector 7 Chika Ph II and Nuh etc

The Board also intends to provide houses to industrial workers for which demand survey is stated to have already been done at Panchkula, Dharuhera Dundahera and Kundli A list of urban houses under _con struction is given at Annexure C

During ioral examination it was revealed that though under the scheme all the district headquarters where the problem was most acute were to be taken up first for the construction of houses yet no such scheme could be launched in Narnaul—the district headquarter of Mohinder garh

The Committee desire that since all the district headquarters and important towns were to be taken up first, due priority be given for the construction of houses at Narnaul The Committee also recommend that in the industrial towns of Yamuna Nagar/Jagadhri and Faridabad, further schemes for the construction of houses be undertaken in view of the prevailing shortage of residential houses in these areas. The Committee also desire that schemes be lauriched specifically for economically weaker sections throughout the State to make Housing Board Schemes popular amongst them, as the Committee firmly believe that after food, a house is the prime need of every person

4 Rural Housing Scheme

Under the Rural Housing Scheme houses are to be constructed in such villages where land is available and there is response from the villagers. The Board has also taken up a scheme of providing cheaper houses in the rural areas of the State from 1982 83. Under the rural housing scheme, the Board has constructed 3044 houses in the villages and Ŷ

has allotted 2403 houses up to 31st March 1985 The details of such houses constructed and allotted by the Board are given in Annexure F During the year 1984-85, the Board completed 674 rural houses-against the target of 500 houses

During the course of oral evidence the Committee was informed that the Rural Housing Scheme was proposed to be dropped as the recovery under that Scheme was too less and the administrative cost was too heavy

The Committee feel that in order to achieve the objective of providing every family with a house and for socio-economic upliftment of Scheduled -Castes, Backward Classes - Economically Weaker Sections of Society -Landless Labourers etc., in rural - areas, it is necessary that they rare provided with cheaper - houses as this - will also help to reduce their exodus to cities

The Committee, therefore, 'recommend-that-instead of dropping the scheme the Board should reforent the "Rural Housing" Scheme by having "greater involvement of Gram' Panchayats in the "implementation of the scheme which would lessen the administrative cost of the Board and enhance the recovery position

5 Other Schemes

- The Housing Board & Haryana, proposes to take up the following - - schemes also -

(1) Mewat Development Scheme

Under the scheme, the Housing 'Board 'Haryana has taken up the construction of houses at Nuh, Hathin, Punhana, Ferozpur Jhirka with the help of margin money provided by the Mewat Development' Board and the Housing Board has received Rs 60 lakhs from the Mewat Develop ment Board for the construction of colonies in 'Mewat Development Area At these stations Housing 'Board 'Haryana is constructing houses for the Government servants of this area and for others under hire 'purchase' scheme

(11) Police Housing Scheme

Housing Board, Haryana has also taken up the scheme of constructing houses for police personnel at Kurukshetra, Sonepat and Susa

(111) - Industrial Housing Scheme

Under this scheme the Board has proposed to construct houses in mdustrialitowns he Panchkula, Dundahera and Dharuhera For this purpose, demand survey has already been done and the Housing Board will take up the construction work as soon as the land is available

(iv) Housing of Non-Resident Indians

-1 Under this scheme the Board will provide houses to non resident _ Indians living abroad on priority basis, these houses will be allotted to _ those who intend to establish industry in Haryana State.

(v) Self Contract Scheme

The Board has also introduced self contract scheme under which every allottee will be deemed to be a contractor for the construction of his own house and he will look after the construction of his own house and he will be issued material and reimbursed labour charges depending upon the progress of construction of the houses After completion of the house it will be allotted to him and the cost of the house is recoverable in easy monthly instalments. The scheme has successfully been launched in Ambala Cantt

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During the course of oral evidence the Committee was informed that under the rental housing scheme of HUDCO any department could get loan from HUDCO for the construction of houses for its emp loyees. It was added that 30 per cent amount was required to be paid by the department in advance and the remaining amount of 70 percent was to be advanced by HUDCO. The recovery thereof was to be made by the Board in six yearly instalments on behalf of HUDCO. The Committee was also informed that there was $2\frac{1}{2}$ percent reservation in houses for allotment to the employees of the Board and it was added that such employees got the houses at cheaper rates as no profit was made or administrative charges levied on such houses

The Committee recommend that the Board should formulate a self financing 'scheme and keeping in view the demand and location, multistoreyed buildings be constructed Separate schemes for non residential Indians should also be started

6 Procedure for Registration/Allotment

The registration is done at the place where the houses are to be constructed Brochure containing the necessary information regarding the allotment, the house designs including the prescribed application form is sold to the public at the cost of Rs 5 each

The Committee feel that the application form requires submission of detailed information on many points, which is beyond the comprehension of common man particularly persons belonging to weaker sections of the society intending to apply for EWS/LIG houses The Committee, therefore, recommend that the procedure for the allotment of houses may be simplified so that the poor/illiterate members of the society do not get scared at the sight of the application form, requiring detailed/complicated information, so as to enable them to make full use of the scheme

In regard to the method of allotment of houses to the persons belong ing to Scheduled Castes the Committee was informed during oral evidence on 11th June 1985 that if the number of applications received was more than that the reserved quota houses then the allotment was made through the draw of lots and the surplus applications were dealt with in the general pool But in case the number of applications was less than that of the reserved quota, then houses were allotted to all such applicants and the remaining number of houses, out of the reserved quota, were included in the general category for allotment He also informed that in case the house was not allotted within two years from the date of application then interest was given on the earnest money at the saving bank account rates

The Committee recommend that in case the number of applications received is less than that of the reserved quota then the Board should consult the Social Welfare Department in that respect

7 Publicit, of various schemes of the Board

The Housing Board had adopted the following means for making publicity of its various schemes —

- (1) Radio publicity through A I R
- (II) Publicity through Newspapers
- (iii) Distribution of hand bills/brochures
- (iv) Cinema slides
- (v) Beating of drums

The Committee recommend that the publicity of various schemes as is presently being made by the Board, does not really prove fruitful in the case of down trodden members of the society Therefore, in order to propogate the schemes properly amongst the weaker sections of the society, the Board should publicise schemes by organising public meetings and by personal contacts in the villages Persons belonging to the weaker sections should in particular be explained the social objective behind the formulation of such schemes so as to popularise such schemes amongst them.

8 Financial Working

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To strengthen economic condition of the Board the following steps were stated to have been taken -

- (a) In completion of the schemes no time lag was left and fresh schemes one after another brought into process
- (b) Administrative expenses on the schemes were kept within the permissible limits to achieve economy
- (c) Timely arrangements of funds on moderate rate, of interest were made by way of loan from State Government-Housing and Urban-Development Corporation Ltd Debentures-werealso floated from-time to time -

(d) Board maintained a close and constant watch on the recoveries of instalments from the allottees for the houses allotted to

them in Urban Sector with satisfactory results in minimisationof the number of defaulters. However, under 20 point programme in rural sector the beneficiaries are reluctant to pay the instalments inspite of personal persuations and due to this reason the economy of the Board might paralyse as big funds have been invested in construction of rural houses against ${}_{6}GIC$ (Joan 12)

During the course of oral examination the representative of the Board-informed-the Committee that-tentative profit-of-Rs-50 02 lakhs,during the years 1982-83, and the profit of Rs 59 69 lakhs during the year 1983 84 accrued rito_the_Board The accumulated profit, as per notional-figures, was --stated to be - to the extent-of-Rs-376 lakhs-----

The Committee observe that the basic object behind the constitution, of the Board is to implement the social housing schemes and not to earn profits. The Committee- would, therefore, like to impress that the profits

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which accrue to the, Board from the sale of HIG houses should be ploughed back so as to reduce the cost of houses meant for EW'S which, though-low-priced,-find difficult acceptance by the people primarily because. the poor people find it difficult, to meet the cost

The Committee also desire that effective steps should be taken by the Board to finalise the accounts for 1984-85 and get them audited from the Accountant General, Haryana at the eacliest.

9 Estimates and Actual expenditure on various projects

In the written reply supplied to the Committee the Board gave in formation about the position of estimates/revised estimates and actual expenditure on various projects the details of which are given at Annex ure D^- . The detailed reasons for esclation in the estimates of Sector 29 Faridabad-project, are given at Annexure E

During the course of oral examination the representative of the Board stated that increase in estimates was due to various reasons e g rise in prices of material. During-the period from April, 1984 to April 1985, the Committee was informed, that in steel alone, an increase of 50 per cent had taken place The increase in price was also ascribed to long period involved in the construction of colony in Sector 29 Faridabad which it was stated, iwas a, big_icolony and 3.4 years were required to complete it

The Committee are not satisfied with the reply of the Board in regard to the abnormal increase in the estimates particularly in regard to the Sector 29, Faridabad project where against the original estimates of Rs 560 13 lakhs, the revised cost shot up to Rs 693 69 lakhs (tentative) The Committee, therefore, desire that the Board should look into this aspect and take, steps to ensure that in future the estimates are prepared in a more realistic manner

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11 Organisational set up

The Housing Board Haryana is headed by the Chairman, Chief Administrator and assisted by the Secretary, Chief Accounts Officer, Divisional Town Planner Superintending Engineer Since 31st March, 1984 five construction divisions are functioning at Karnal, Faridabad I and II, Panchkula and Hissar under the administrative control of the Board These are headed by an officer of the rank of Executive Engine er The controlling Officer of these construction divisions is Superintending Engineer In the matter of conditions of service, leave, pay, allowances and punishment and appeal etc Civil Service Rules and Government policies have been made applicable Direct recruitment is made through Employment Exchange The schedule of staff for the year 1984 85, indicating the designations number of posts and scales of pay and chart of organisational set up, are given in Annexure H

The control of the Housing Board, Haryana, vests in the Housing Department headed by the Housing Minister, Haryana, and assisted by the Commissioner and Secretary to Government, Haryana Housing Department

Against the total sanctioned strength of 550 posts, 450 employees were in position 100 posts were thus stated to be lying vacant

During the course of oral examination, the representative of the Board informed the Committee that the posts were filled in accordance to the norm whenever there was any need to fill them. It was added that the recruitment was made through the Employment Exchange or by taking the staff on deputation Ċ,

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The Committee desire that in view of the steep rise in expenditure, as is reflected in the above figures, every possible effort should be made to effect economy to the maximum possible extent on the administrative charges. The Committee find from the material furnished to them that against the total sanctioned strength of 550 employees, 450 employees were in position. More than 100-posts had remained vacant in the earlier vear also. The Committee, threefore, desire that for the present 100 posts, which are lying vacant, should not be filled and no new post should be created

During the course of oral evidence the representative of the Board informed the Committee that Shri BL Ahuja visited Nigeria for attending Housing Conference The other two officers went abroad for attending training course and the expenditure in regard thereto was borne by the HUDCO

The Committee observe that such tours should be undertaken/allowed sparingly and only when the benefits to be achieved from such tours really out-weigh the expenditure to be incurred, as such tours cause considerable burden on the Board and ultimately on the allottees

The Committee are unhappy to observe that a large number of employees are under suspension and no serious efforts are being made by the Board to finalise the cases of persons under suspension Prolonged suspension undoubtedly have an adverse effect on the finances and efficiency of the Board The Committee, therefore, desire that all such cases, some of which are pending since 1979, be finalised without delay and progress made be reported to the Committee within a period of six months of the presentation of this report in the Vidhan Sabha

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14 Purchase of Material

The Housing Board Haryana has been constructing houses at various places in Haryana The procedure/policy to purchase the material which has been adopted by the Board is as per 3rd schedule of dele gation of financial powers

Durify the course of evidence on 10th June 1985 when it was pointed out to the representative of the Board that there was a general complaint that the material used in the construction of the houses was substandard, it was submitted that steps were being taken to improve the quality of the material

The Committee desire that effective steps should immediately be taken to ensure the use of good quality material according to the specification so as to maintain the standard of construction and longivity of houses. The Committee feel that it will take decades to fully meet the requirement of houses in the State and if after about ten' years the houses start falling due to the use of sub standard material and we have to re build such houses, it shall never be possible to fully meet the demand of houses for the houseless people. The Committee feel that the Board has been entrusted with the sacred task of providing houses for different categories of people including a vast majority of people belonging to the economically weaker sections of the society None should, therefore, be allowed to play with the aspiration of the houseless persons in the society

The Committee, therefore, recommend that in order to ensure use of good quality material according to specifications in future, for each block of houses constructed by the Board, complete details of the material used, including the proportion of cement, type of wood with thickness etc etc should be written in the Measifirement Book The names of the Superintending Engineer/Executive Engineer/concerned officer should also be written against each block along with the aforesaid details. Similar particulars should also be kept in the office' record If any case of improper use of material comes to the notice it should be promptly investigated and exemplary punishment be awarded to the concerned officers/staff

15 Buildings/Hired/Purchased/Taken on Lease/Rent by the Board

The Board furnished written information in regard to the number of buildings hired/purchased and taken on rent/lease at Chandigarh, in the State of Haryana and outside the State Detailed information in regard thereto is given in Annexure G The Committee noticed that a Shop cum Flat in Sector 8 Chandigarh was taken by the Board on 27th April 1981 on a monthly rent of Rs 10,000 The rent was sub sequently increased to Rs 17 000 p m w ef 1st April 1984 The Committee felt intrigued about the disproportionate, increase made in the monthly rent and asked the representative of the Board to furnish a detailed note giving full background of the matter The Board sub mitted to the Committee following note in regard to the increase of rent of SCO'No 126 127, Sector 8, Chandigarh —

^{**}S C Q No^{1/2} 126 127, Sector 8 Chandigarh was taken on rent by the Housing Board, Haryana on 27th April, 1981 on a r. ~

rent of Rs 10000/ per month The total area of 4 floors is approximately 11616 sq ft The landlord had originally offered this building for a period of 2 years and had stated in his offer that after this period of 2 years there will be revision of rent according to mutual agreement

Subsequently on 6th April 1983 the landlord gave a re 2 presentation asking for an increase of rent He also mention ed that the rent restriction Act is not applicable to this building for a period of 5 years and the same period had not yet elapsed Therefore the landlord argued that the competent authority can raise the rent to reduce the hardship to the landlord The landlord cited the case of the Technical Education Depart Accord ment which had sought legal advice on this issue ingly a reference was made to Technical Education Depart ment on 18th April 1983 The Technical Education Depart ment on 16th April 1965. The recinical Education Depart ment informed on 14th July, 1983 that they had taken a building in SCO No 181 182. Sector 8—C on rent on 1st October 1979 at 85 paise sq ft for 3 years After expiry of this period of 3 years after mutual discussions with the landlord the rent was fixed at Rs 1 85 sq ft with effect from 1st October 1982 The department also in formed that the proposal for this increase was sent to the Government and the department was awaiting Government s approval

- 3 A reference had also been made to the Senior Town Planner of HUDA about the rent at which they had taken their office building The Senior Town Planner informed that they had taken the building at Rs 1 50 per sq ft for basement and Rs 2/ sq ft for first and second floors
- 4 Keeping in view these facts it was felt that the Board was paying the landlord considerably less rent than the market rate and less even when compared with the rates being paid by the other Government departments and autonomous bodies
- Therefore an agenda item was placed before the Board and the Board in its 80th meeting decided to increase the rent to Rs 12 000/ per month The landlord made another re presentation on 15th September 1983 alleging that the ar bitratory enhancement of the amount made by the Board was insignificant He reiterated that the Rent Restriction Act did not apply to this building as the period of 5 years had not elapsed
- 5 The matter was examined and was again placed before the Board for consideration in the 83rd meeting It was mentioned in the agenda item that it had been ascertained that the market rent of such a building ranged from Rs 20,000/_to Rs 25,000/ per month It was also stated that in order to avoid litigation the rent should be enhanced suitably The Board decided to increase the rent from Rs 12,000/ per month to Rs 17 000/ per month with effect from 1st April, 1984 The landlord vide his letter dated the 5th April, 1984

accepted this rent under protest saying that it was still short of the existing market rent Subsequently, the landlord had been visiting the office for further increase in the rent but his request had not been entertained

- 6 From the above facts it will be seen that the rent paid to the landlord after the approval of the Board was considerably lesser than the market rent of the building and low even compared to the rent being paid by other departments and autonomous bodies of the State Government for the buildings hired during the corresponding period The building was newly constructed when it was occupied by the Housing Board Haryana and, therefore the increase given by the Board is not contrary to the law
- The rent being paid at present is considerably lower than the prevalent market rates in this area and no favour has been shown to the landlord in giving this increase ,

During the course of evidence, the representative of the Board stated that the rent of building taken on hire was got assessed from the PWD (B & R) as required under the instructions of the Haryana Government but it was added further in the case of Head Office Building the rent -had not been got assessed through the PWD, (B & R)

The Committee are pained to observe that 70 percent increase in rent was made in the case of Head Office Building and assessment of rent in regard thereto was not got made through the P W D, (B & R) and the agreement, if any, executed was not made available to the Committee

The Committee would like that in future requests for increase in rent of the buildings hired by the Board should be examined carefully and only such increase be allowed as are warranted by law/assessment made by the P W D (B & R)

In view of the heavy amount of rent being paid in respect of the private buildings the Committee would like the Government to consider the desirability of shifting the office of the Board to Panchkula or to other suitable place in the State, where the Board can construct appropriate building for its own offices. It is paradoxical that while the Board is constructing houses for others, it has no permanent house of its own

From the above details the Committee find that very heavy expend iture was being incurred on the use of vehicles In some cases the expenditure on maintenance /POL was as high as Rs 44,000/ on one vehicle during one year

The Committee would therefore, like to impress upon the Board the need for observing utmost economy in the use of vehicles by the Officers of the Board The Committee would also like the Board to fix ceiling on the maximum expenditure to be incurred on repairs/POL on each vehicle and definite guidelines about the use of staff cars by Chairman and other officers be also laid and proper control be exercised in enforcing the guidelines Where it is noticed that the guidelines have not been complied with by any officer, strict action may be taken beside effecting recovery of the expenditure incurred in excess of the prescribed limit

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ANNEXURE E

The original estimate of Sector 29 Fandabad project was 560 13 lakhs and it was revised to Rs 693 69 lakhs Detailed reasons for this escalation are as under -

1 The estimated cost of project was Rs 560 13 lakhs which was revised to Rs 670 40 000 instead of Rs 693 69 lakhs The figures of Rs 693 69 lakhs was not based on actual revised Administrative Approval but on tentative basis The detailed reasons for escalation of cost from Rs 560 13 lakhs to Rs 670 40 lakhs are given as below —

- (1) These houses were constructed during the period of 1982 85 and during this period Govt of India introduced dual price system of cement 50% of the total requirement of levy cement was being allotted by the Food & Supplies Department to Housing Board Haryana and balance 50% of the quantity had to be procured and non levy cement at much higher rates. The difference in rate of cement provided in the agreement at the time of allotment of work and market rate of non levy cement purchased from the market was about Rs 20% per bag extra which contributed to about 4% of the excess on total cost of the scheme
- (11) In addition to the use of non levy cement composite mortar has to be used in the Masonry work of the houses which too contributed to the increase in the cost of the scheme around 1/
- (III) During the construction of houses from 1982 to 1985 the ceiling premium on Haryana PWD Schedule of rates 1974 had an upward revision twice on 1 10 83 and 1 5 84 respectively The ceiling premium on brick work increased from 200 / to 300 / and on other items 125 / to 135 / Similarly there was a revision in the ceiling premium of Public Health and Electrical installation works The revision in ceiling premium contributed to about 9 / increase in the total cost of the scheme
- (iv) Due to decontrol of bricks the rates of bricks in the market gone high time to time and it reached at the peak during 1983 due to all India level strike by the BKOs Due to high rates of bricks the contractors demanded extra rate about Rs 70/ per / Nos bricks while quoting their rates in the tender Similarly the price of steel in the market went up substantially and the contractors demanded on extra average rate of Rs 1000/ per MT at the time of quoting their fates The increase in the market rate of bricks and steel con tributed to about $4/_0$ in the total cost of the scheme
- (v) The Angle iron steel chowkhats were provided in the design of the houses and due to increase in the rate of steel in the market the contractor demanded the rate of Rs 8/ per KG against Rs 5 50 per KG provided in the DNIT which contributed about 1 / excess on the total cost of the scheme
- (vi) The cost of the scheme was also increased due to providing cement paint to the exterior surfaces of the houses and colour wash to the interior surfaces of the houses. This contributed to increase of $1/_0$ of the total cost of the scheme
